Balls & Chains is a rollicking musical journey, from 1820 Blighty to 1850 Botany Bay.

A tragedy and comedy in 4 musical acts.

Through song Balls & Chains renders the evolution of the penal colony towards a free Australia.

The stories of the superiors and convicts tell of their journeys towards freedom.

The convict stain, the heritage we once denied, becomes pride as our ancestors stories are laid bare.

Balls & Chain is a traditional musical, with no dialogue or narrator.

A cast of 40 perform 20 songs over 2 hours. The songs, music and our singers tell the story.

> Performances are proposed for June to August of 2017, with dates to be confirmed.

Set in the grounds of Fannie Bay Gaol, Darwin With 10 evening performances over 2 weeks, For audiences of up to 300 each performance.

Edward Joseph Egan AO, was born in Melbourne, 6 July 1932. He moved to the Northern Territory in 1949 and worked as a public servant, mostly with Aboriginal people.

Ted began recording in 1969 and has released 28 albums, mostly themed around outback life, people, history and Aboriginal stories. He has been a consistent performer and tourer, with his preferred instrument the empty beer carton, drumming his beat. He is a prolific singer and songwriter of contemporary folk music.

Ted was made a Member of the Order of Australia in 1993, for his services to Aboriginal people and for his ongoing contribution to the literary heritage of Australia through verse and song.

Ted served as Administrator of the Northern Territory from 2003 to 2007. In 2004 Ted was promoted to an Officer of the Order of Australia - AO, as acknowledgement of his significant contribution to the community, culminating in his appointment as the 18th Administrator of the Northern Territory.

Ted is listed among Australia's National Living Treasures, by the National Trust of Australia. Ted was presented with a Lifetime Achievement Award at the 2014 Tamworth Country Music Festival. Ted also received The National Folk Festivals' Lifetime Achievement Award in 2015 in Canberra.

Ted is an avid historian and recently attained his Doctorate in History at Charles Darwin University. Ted is a prolific story teller and he does it through words, song, music, books, films and performance.

A number of songs in Balls & Chains were part of his album, The Convicts. Ted performed the first incarnation of Balls & Chains as part of The Administrator's Pleasure Concert in 2006. Very talented musicians, Darwin's choirs, alongside 30 children from Charles Darwin University's Centre for Youth Music performed 6 songs.

Over the following years Ted wrote more songs, and found other Australian folk classics and poetry to complete storylines, to see Balls and Chains become a fully fledged musical.

Now at 83, Ted would like to see Balls & Chains on the stage within the decade, in Australia and the UK.

Recently Ted has collaborated with his granddaughter Frances Bunji Elcoate to bring Balls & Chains to fruition.

Balls and Chains is set in London, England and Botany Bay, Australia, during the 1820 to 1850 era. A period where England sent the most convict laden ships to Australia, to empty their prisons. Causing a great debate to rage between England and Australia to abolish transportation to the evolving colony. The convicts were caught between bureaucracy, poverty and hard labour, while they waited for their freedom. Balls & Chains is based on the true history of Australia.

The stain of convict blood in ones heritage is not something one talks about in polite society. An embarrassment buried in our history. But as the colony grew stronger and older, the stain once a shame, has become a label proud to wear, by dinki-di Aussies searching for their heritage.

The painful past is revealed. The toff's want to rid old England of the vile scum crowding the prisons. Lord Trilby agrees the godforsaken colony is the best place to send the rotten lot.

The Lord Chief Justice seems a buffoon, but soon proves to be a beast as he sentences, Jim Jones a villainous cur, the Whores, Scumbags and young Millie and Jamie and their urchin cohorts, to transportation, for the term of their natural lives. They farewell old England forever.

The convict hoi polloi, come to grips with transportation and life in the colony under the tyrannical rule of the Flogger and Bessie Bossy Boots, who present themselves as benevolent custodians, but their true colours are soon revealed, when Governor Starling and his wife arrive to rehabilitate the convict soum towards a civilized life beyond a penal colony.

Bessie and Flogger soon prove the reprobate convicts are beyond rehabilitation and Governor Starling is swayed to bring back the lash. Jim Jones, a cur to his superiors, a good man turned bad by the system he is trapped in, is beaten to remind the convicts of their place in society. The motherland's tortuous system remains to control the riff raff.

Some 30 years later, the Whores, Soumbags and Urchins after many trials and tribulations in their struggle for freedom, have turned their lives around and birthed a new generation of free Australians. Urchin, Jamie is now a magistrate and Mille a teacher, with a family of their own.

As the convict ships cease and the penal colony fades a new Australia emerges. A jury of our former convicts, pass judgment on Flogger and Bessie Bossy Boots wicked crimes. Jim Jones hell bent on a murderous revenge, finds freedom is possible rather than the noose.

Our convicts have their freedom, a worthy life and a home they call Australia. Their ancestors, who build the foundations of today's Australia proudly carry the convict stain.

ACT One

Australia Today

Scene #1: The Convict Stain

The ancestors of the Whores and Scumbags tell of their convict blood, once an embarrassment and buried in our history. But the stain, once a shame, has become a label proud to wear, by dinki-di Aussies searching for their heritage.

England 1820

Scene #2: For the Terms of Their Natural Lives - Garden Party

The toff's want to rid old England of the vile scum crowding the prisons. Lord Trilby agrees the godforsaken colony is the best place to send the rotten lot.

Scene #3: The Lord Chief Justice - Courtroom

The Lord Chief Justice, an over privileged buffoon, lords over the classes, he directs the jury to rid bonny England of the lower class scum, to maintain status quo the upper class deserve.

Scene #4: Jim Jones - Part 1 - Courtroom

Jim Jones is sentenced, the Lord Chief Justice threatens him with all the misfortune a life in Botany bay will bring. Jim Jones swears he will seek revenge on all who mistreat him.

Scene #5: A Bunch of Damned Whores - Part 1 - Courtroom

The Whores – Molly, Morag, Brigid and Megan tell the jury of their life and crimes, to no avail, they are sentenced to transportation.

Scene #6: The Scum of the Earth - Part 1 - Courtroom

The Scumbags – Michael, Solomon, Dominic and Martin, tell the jury of their life and crimes, to no avail, they are sentenced to transportation.

Scene #7: Don't Even Know - Courtroom

The Urchins mob are brought before the court, Millie and Jamie appeal to the jury, how is their birth into poverty a crime? The jury does not soften and they are sentenced to transportation.

Scene #8: The Green Fields of England - Courtroom

The Whores, Scumbags and urchins sing farewell to their homes family and England forever.



ACT Two

Australia/Botany Bay 1822

Our convicts have spent 2 years in the penal colony at Botany Bay.

Scene #9: Welcome to Australia - Penal Colony

Bessy and Flogger welcome the new Governor and Lady Starling to the prison. They show how their control of their charges. Governor Starling and Lady Starling sing of their opinion of convicts and changes to come rehabilitating the convicts toward their freedom.

Scene #10: Flogger and Bessy Bossy Boots - Penal Colony

The Urchins tell Governor and Lady Starling what Flogger and Bessie are really like and their plight for existence.

Scene #11: If Ever - Penal Colony

The Urchins tell Governor and Lady Starling what they dream of, if they ever get out of prison.

Scene #12: A Bunch of Damned Whores - Part 2

The Whores tell Governor and Lady Starling how they are settling into their new home and have found a husband and look forward to their new life.

Scene #13: The Scum of the Earth - Part 2

The Scumbags tell Governor and Lady Starling how they have improved their lives and have found a future and a partner to share it with.

ACT Three

Australia/Botany Bay 1825 – Penal Colony 3 years after Governor Starlings liberal approach to convict control.

Scene #14: The Hard Men

The hard men threaten Governor, Lady Starling begs Jim Jones to save him from the scum of the earth. Bessie and Flogger have proven to Governor and Lady Starling the convicts are beyond rehabilitation. Jim Jones helps control the vile convicts, hoping for liberty.

Scene #15: Bring Back The Lash - Penal Colony

Bessie and Flogger convince the Governor to bring back the lash, as the only way to control the convict scum. The Governor changes his mind and brings back harsh punishment, ignoring his wife's plea for continued rehabilitation.

Scene #16 Ne Plus Ultra / Jim Jones - Part 3 - Penal Colony

Jim Jones is dragged to the whipping post. Bessie and Flogger sing the praises of harsh punishment, the only way to control the scum. Jim is flogged to near death, but swears he will seek revenge on the scoundrel pair that have made his life hell.



ACT Four

Botany Bay 1850. 30 years later.

Scene #17: Currency Lads and Lasses - Penal Colony

The new generation of free born Australians sing the praise of the new country they have inherited.

Scene #18: Remember: New Rules / Jim Jones - Part 4 - Penal Colony Bush Court

A court is convened, James is now a Magistrate, the grown Urchins and elderly Whores and Scumbags bear witness to Flogger and Bessie's heinous treatment of convicts. They are sentenced ironically to community service. Jim Jones arrives hell bent on revenge. Millie and James deter Jim from his crime.

Scene #19: Think of Me - Penal Colony

Our convicts sing of the harness they endured and overcame, their achievements and the glories of this land. The convict blood that runs in you and me made Australia what it is today.

Scene #20: Balls and Chains FINALE

Gone are the shackles of the past, a new world has risen beneath the southern cross, our children will inherit with pride.

Fannie Bay Gaol operated as Her Majesty's Gaol and Labour Prison, from 20 September 1883 until 1 September 1979. Today it is open as an historic site, the integrity of the precinct and the severity of the buildings still convey the oppressive atmosphere for which they were originally intended. This uniquely suitable venue can only add credence to the era, stories, authenticity and experience.

The parade yard in front of the prison buildings has lent itself to a number of events, films and theatrical performances over the years. The perfect place to stage *Balls and Chains*. With numerous buildings and lawn area to dress as Botany Bay Penal Colony and plenty of space in buildings for cast changing, musicians and crew gear, also enough public toilets.

The Museum and Art Gallery of the Northern Territory, MAGNT, manages the site and it is open to the public everyday 10am – 3pm, free of charge/by donation. Fannie Bay Gaol is on the corner of East Point Road & Ross Smith Avenue, Fannie Bay, Darwin NT.



NOISE restrictions due to surrounding homes will see the 3 hour performance, including interval, between 7.30pm and 10.30pm and the site shut down by 11pm.

PARKING – whilst Fannie Bay Goals defined carpark fits 20+ cars comfortably, the surrounding grassed areas can be opened up to controlled parking and drop of area by parking attendants. Surrounding beachfront parking, business parking at Fannie Bay shops along with street parking will cope with 200+ cars.

FOOD & DRINKS - Pre show (from 6.30pm) and during interval we will offer our audience, alcoholic beverages and light snacks from the mess hall. With appropriate alcohol licenses obtained.

TOILETS – there is ample public toilets in place.

AUDIENCE NUMBERS - 300 people per evening, seated on chairs.

BOX OFFICE - The gaol's visitors building at the front entrance will become our box office.

SECURITY - 1 security guard per 100 people x 3 during performances and 1 overnight and daytime guards will patrol.



Ted has created a world class musical, the skilled creative team, along with the talented singers and musicians will be able to bring to fruition, a great Australian story, totally written, produced and performed in the NT by Territorians.

NEW WORK - In 2015 script development took place. That brought the songs together with characters. Some verses were added to fulfil story lines. The songs paced and plotted to flow and bring a full resolve to our characters lives and story lines. We are confident that the script will take the audience an emotional journey as desperate plight becomes elated freedom. Audiences will also be subject to a very entertaining history lesson.

CLASSIFICATION - *Balls* & *Chains* is mildly bawdy, mildly violent with some mild cursing. It is not suitable for children, parental guidance for audiences under 15 is recommended. As fiction, based on fact, it portrays a harsh penal colony and all the diversity of characters, good and evil, that gave birth to our Aussie culture.

DESIGNED FOR POTENTIAL - The musical is designed to enable easy staging, with few sets and props, to best allow for small or large venues to stage the show economically.

The script, DVD and musical score and recording CD (and digitally), will be packaged and the theatrical rights available to distribute *Balls & Chains*, to any group wishing to perform it.

The Darwin performances will be well documented through photography and film to produce a DVD, for sale and to guide further performances.

It's all about the people singing their stories and the marvelous music, *Balls & Chains* could be seen in country halls accompanied on a piano or a CD, with a small choir, as well as grand theatres with orchestras, across Australia, the UK and beyond.




