<u>Wallerawang - State Championships</u>

Friday On 22nd February, our small contingent arrived Wallerawang (about 7 kms outside Lithgow) for the Sailability State Championships. There our champion, Stephen Davies together with his carers Julia and Sharon, Peter Shelley Singer & Patrick and Rosalie Alexander.



This was Lithgow Sailability's first event and was very well organized. Our thanks to Tom Papas for the time and energy he put into the weekend. A mobile pontoon with special winch, was loaned by National Parks and Wildlife from Manly Dam, and played a large part in the success of the event.

Sailing commenced on Saturday morning around 10.00am, following a race briefing some 30 boats with different coloured sails created quite a spectacle for those of us watching the races. Sailing continued on Sunday morning winding up around 1.30.

Accommodation (which was excellent) was arranged at the Black Gold Cabins. The buildings are a conversion of the old Wallerawang Public School buildings.

About 20 participants and their support families were accommodated there and gave everyone a great opportunity to socialise and meet volunteers from other Sailability Clubs.

CHARLIE'S CHARIOT

Charlie's Chariot was slipped in February to remove the heavily encrusted hulls of barnacles and weeds and then given a couple of coats of boot topping.

The engine was given a detailed service at the same time

In order to reduce this marine growth between slipping it was decided to give the hulls an occasional scrub either from the boat or by a swimmer snorkelling. There is a short handled brush and a long handled broom on board to facilitate this activity during those idle moments on



the boat, or if someone is interested in the swimming and snorkelling approach please don't hesitate to volunteer.

During the engine service both filters were found to be full of water which could have caused a major engine failure. A larger primary filter has been installed located on the Starboard quarter next to the battery and it is fitted with sight glass. At the end of each sailing activity the boat driver is to check if there is water at the bottom of the filter and if so, to drain it out - there is a cloth in the port side locker for this function.

Crews are also requested to use the two fenders when coming alongside as it was noticed the boats topsides are showing signs of wear and tear.
